AN ACT

1 2 3 4 5 6	Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," in school safety and security, providing for trauma-informed records program.
7	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
8	hereby enacts as follows:
9	Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known
10	as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding a
11	section to read:
12	Section 1306.1-B. Trauma-informed records program.
13	(a) Trauma-informed records program establishment and record
14	maintenanceA school district that participates in the School
15	Safety and Security Grant Program established under section
16	<u>1306-B may establish a trauma-informed records program. If a</u>
17	school district opts to establish a trauma-informed records
18	program, the school district shall maintain electronic records,
19	overseen by a certified school counselor, in a format developed

1	by the Department of Education that includes information
2	relating to traumatic events and adverse childhood experiences
3	<u>of a student, including:</u>
4	(1) Information provided by a county or law enforcement
5	agency regarding a student.
6	(2) Information provided by a family-authorized medical
7	provider regarding a student.
8	(3) Information concerning in-school incidents regarding
9	a student that would prompt a call to a law enforcement
10	agency, behavioral health unit, mobile crisis unit, school
11	safety program or student support service such as a student
12	<u>assistance program as defined in 22 Pa. Code § 12.16</u>
13	(relating to definitions).
14	(4) Information provided by a behavioral health unit, a
15	mobile crisis unit, a school safety program or a student
16	support service such as a student assistance program as
17	defined in 22 Pa. Code § 12.16.
18	(5) A statement written by the school's certified school
19	counselor concerning the overall well-being of the student
20	that excludes confidential information.
21	(6) A summary of known triggers for the student that
22	induce symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder relating to
23	previous exposure to trauma that excludes confidential
24	information provided by a behavioral health unit, mobile_
25	crisis unit, school safety program, student support service
26	or family-authorized medical provider.
27	(7) A support plan detailing how a school district will
28	care for the student regarding the history of traumatic
29	exposure and overall well-being of the student.
30	(8) Any information voluntarily given by a parent or

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1 guardian concerning a student.

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2	(b) AdministratorIn the event a school district does not
3	have a certified school counselor employed, a school board may
4	select a currently employed school administrator to oversee the
5	trauma-informed records. A school administrator selected by the
6	school board shall undergo educational training relating to
7	trauma-informed approaches as outlined under section 1205.7 as
8	well as training relating to record management.
9	(c) Tiers of informationThe Department of Education, in
10	developing an electronic format for trauma-informed records,
11	shall classify information into the following three tiers:
12	(1) Tier one shall include all aspects of a student's
13	trauma-informed record, as well as the contact information of
14	any outside agency that has provided information to a school
15	district concerning a traumatic event of a student.
16	(2) Tier two shall only include a summary of traumatic
17	events with a list of known triggers for a student that
18	induces post-traumatic stress disorder symptoms relating to
19	previous trauma exposure that excludes confidential
20	information, as well as include the support plan for the
21	student in place by the school district.
22	(3) Tier three shall only include a brief statement
23	concerning the overall well-being of a student.
24	(d) UseInformation maintained in trauma-informed records
25	are to be utilized exclusively for assisting:
26	(1) A school district in developing the trauma-informed
27	capacity to support the student population.
28	(2) A school district in developing instructional
29	approaches under section 1205.7.
30	(3) School officials as a part of the determination

1	process of in-school supports needed for a student.
2	(e) ConfidentialityA student's trauma-informed record
3	shall be considered confidential, and the record content may
4	only be divulged if considered appropriate by the certified
5	school counselor or the school administrator responsible for the
6	maintenance of the records and with parental agreement in some
7	instances. The following authorities shall have access to
8	request information within the records:
9	(1) The parent or guardian of a student for which the
10	school district has maintained a record.
11	(2) School officials and professional employees. All
12	school officials or professional employees must have written
13	authorization by the certified school counselor or the school
14	administrator responsible for the maintenance of the records
15	in order to view a student's trauma-informed record. The
16	written authorization shall outline to which tier a school
17	official or professional employee has access. A school
18	official or professional employee must request access to a
19	student's record each time they want to access the record.
20	(3) A family-authorized medical provider. All family-
21	authorized medical providers must have written authorization
22	by the student's parent or guardian in order to view a
23	student's record.
24	(4) Cooperating county or law enforcement agencies. All
25	cooperating county and law enforcement agencies must have
26	written authorization by the student's parent or guardian in
27	order to view a student's record.
28	(5) The student for which a record has been maintained.
29	(f) TransferWhenever a pupil transfers to another grant-
30	funded school entity or grant-funded nonpublic school under this

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1	article, a certified copy of the student's trauma-informed
2	record shall be transmitted to the school entity or nonpublic
3	school to which the pupil has transferred. The school entity or
4	nonpublic school to which the student has transferred should
5	request the record. The sending school entity or nonpublic
6	school shall have 10 days from receipt of the request to supply
7	a certified copy of the student's record. The transfer of the
8	record shall be administered by the school counselors or school
9	administrator selected by the school boards of the respective
10	school entities or nonpublic schools.
11	(g) RetentionIn the event a school district no longer
12	continues to receive grant funding under this article, or in the
13	event a pupil no longer attends the school district, the school
14	shall retain trauma-informed records for no longer than two
15	years after the discontinuation of funding or disenrollment of
16	the student. The district shall then destroy all trauma-informed
17	records maintained by a process promulgated by the Department of
18	Education.
19	(h) Record establishmentA parent or guardian of a student
20	shall be notified of a trauma-informed record being established
21	for that student and shall either approve or reject the creation
22	<u>of a trauma record.</u>
23	(i) DefinitionsAs used in this section, the following
24	words and phrases shall have the meanings given to them in this
25	subsection unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
26	"Trauma." The term includes results from an event, series of
27	events or set of circumstances that is experienced by an
28	individual as physically or emotionally harmful or threatening
29	and that has lasting adverse effects on the individual's
30	cognitive functioning and physical, social, emotional, mental or
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1 <u>spiritual well-being.</u>

2	"Trauma-informed approach." Includes a school-wide approach
3	to education and a classroom-based approach to student learning
4	that recognizes the signs and symptoms of trauma and responds by
5	fully integrating knowledge about trauma into policies,
6	professional learning, procedures and practices for the purposes
7	of recognizing the presence and onset of trauma, resisting the
8	reoccurrence of trauma and promoting resiliency tailored to a
9	school entity's culture, climate and demographics and the
10	community as a whole.
11	"Traumatic event." The term includes an event or series of
12	events that causes physical, emotional or psychological harm and
13	has lasting adverse effects on the individual's cognitive
14	functioning and physical, social, emotional, mental or spiritual
15	well-being.

16 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.

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
